LETTER FROM THE CEO



As the CEO of the Enoch Pratt Free Library, I want to express my gratitude to all our customers and partners who've welcomed me so graciously into the Baltimore community. It has been such a pleasure meeting so many of you, and hearing how the libraries have, and continue to touch your lives. The library has also been an important place for me, a place of second chances.

I grew up in a small town in North Carolina. I attended the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill and eventually ended up dropping out of school for almost 10 years. For years, I struggled with underemployment and wondering where I would sleep at night. A decade after I left UNC, it was a conversation with my grandmother that changed the course of my life. She reminded me of the people that

came before me that died for me to have the opportunities that I was squandering. From that point forward, I worked as hard as I could to pay the debt to those that came before me, and to improve my life because I finally wanted to. I got a job at the UNC-CH library driving a golf cart delivering books to different campus libraries and departments. This position opened my eyes to the impact a library could have. Dean Fred Clark and my friend Matt Welborn convinced me and assisted me in returning to school, and my path towards a profession in libraries began.

I am fortunate to work at the Enoch Pratt Free Library, one of the premiere libraries in the world. I'm getting to know Baltimore by visiting each branch, and holding Town Hall meetings to hear from you directly what you would like to see for the future of your library. We want to make sure the library is whatever you want it to be, and whatever you need it to be. The Pratt is a key part of the future of our city, and we have a responsibility to hear what each of you wants that future to look like. The work we do at public libraries is important. This work helps change people's lives.

ANNOUNCING THE PRATT ANYWHERE LAB AT OPEN WORKS

The Pratt Library is proud to announce a new technology lab in partnership with Open Works, located inside the East Baltimore maker space. This is the first location for the new Pratt Anywhere program funded with American Rescue Plan funding through the Mayor's Office of Recovery Programs.

"Pratt Anywhere gives the library an opportunity to expand our resources and services beyond the walls of our 22 locations," says Pratt Library President & CEO Chad Helton. "Open Works is the first site where we're able to provide free work stations with the latest technology that anyone can come in and use. We want to give people the tools they need to reach their dreams and Pratt Anywhere is another way the library is opening the doors of access to our community."

The new Pratt Anywhere at Open Works lab is outfitted with 17 state-of-the-art work stations supported with newly installed high-speed networking infrastructure to ensure seamless internet access. Each work station is equipped with a suite of industry-leading software tools to help foster learning, creativity, and innovation. Those tools cater to a wide range of needs including graphic design, 3D modeling, video editing, and broadcasting. The Pratt Library will also provide regular technology and digital literacy classes within the space.

The lab is free to use for anyone in the community during the hours Open Works is open. "Open Works is thrilled to partner with the Enoch Pratt Free Library to make our computer lab free to the community," says Open Works Executive Director Will Holman. "Access to resources is a cornerstone to building a more equitable Baltimore where everyone has the opportunity to thrive."






Sunrise on the Reaping by Suzanne Collins


There Is No Place For Us by Brian Goldstone





SOCIAL WORKER IN THE LIBRARY



MARCH IS SOCIAL WORK MONTH!

We are excited to celebrate our Pratt social workers this Social Work Month. Our social workers have impacted thousands of lives. They also launched a new program, Lawyer in the Library: Immigration Legal Information, and helped teach a new Social Work 101 course to Library staff across the city.

3,500 CUSTOMER ENGAGEMENTS

in FY24, up 20% from FY23

Here are just a few of the ways they've impacted customers' lives:

HELP WITH MEDICAL BILLS

A customer recently diagnosed with cancer came to the Library seeking help paying her medical bills. She'd recently had a lengthy in-patient stay costing thousands. A Library social worker was able to assist her with applying for charity care to reduce her medical bills by \$40,000 and set up an affordable payment plan for the remaining medical debt.

FOOD STAMP ASSISTANCE

A senior gentleman came to the social work drop-in table after he hadn't received his food stamp benefits in more than a year. The social worker was able to look up his benefits and see that someone had been fraudulently stealing them. The social worker was able to help the customer apply for more than \$4,000 in reimbursement for his stolen benefits.


A PATH TO CITIZENSHIP

A Pratt social worker has spent two years working with an Iranian couple to assist with their health insurance, food stamps, and housing. Recently, the wife took and passed her citizenship exam but she was not given a date for her naturalization ceremony. The Library social worker assisted her with filing an appeal and helped her get a date for her ceremony. After the ceremony, the Library social worker assisted her with applying for her first US passport, which she used to visit her family in Iran for the first time in over five years.

A NETWORK OF RESOURCES

A new mother, who is undocumented, came to the Pratt seeking assistance with more than \$12,000 in medical bills from the birth of her child. The social worker was able to connect her with Healthcare Access Maryland who helped her file for retroactive Medicaid coverage via Maryland Healthy Babies programs to cover the cost of her delivery.




