

BUILDING UPDATES

HERRING RUN

Phase I of the Herring Run renovation is starting to wrap up. Ceiling tile has been replaced in the building and new carpet is installed throughout the library. Walls and shelving have a new paint color. Brand new technology furniture has been delivered. We hope to reopen the Branch in late November. It will close again in 2025 for a full HVAC replacement.

BROOKLYN

Work is underway in the Brooklyn Branch on an interior refresh. Staff worked to remove all the collections from the library as construction work starts. The Bookmobile is making bimonthly stops to the Branch during this closure.

WASHINGTON VILLAGE

Funding is in place for the new Pigtown Library project. The current library building is expected to be demolished this fall with construction starting in the spring. The new Pigtown Library will be double the square footage of the current one with apartment units on top of it.

JOHNSTON SQUARE

Ground was broken this summer on the new Johnston Square library. Construction is underway on the building which includes a library and more than 100 apartments.
